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SOCIALISATION

Think of socialisation not as simply "showing" your puppy new things, but as helping them feel comfortable and relaxed around different environments, teaching them to ignore distractions. For example, taking your puppy to a coffee shop where they become overly excited or stressed can leave them with a negative impression of that place. Instead, focus on practicing basic training in new environments to show your puppy that these places are no big deal. This approach helps habituate them to their surroundings, building their confidence and calmness.

By introducing your puppy to a wide variety of experiences calmly, such as new sounds, textures, situations, and environments during their early development, you're preparing them to handle unexpected or unusual scenarios as an adult with confidence and ease. They'll be more likely to remain calm and composed because they've learned how to navigate similar experiences.

Using your socialisation checklist can be a helpful tool to ensure you're covering all the bases, giving your puppy the best chance to thrive in any situation they encounter later in life.

Use YouTube to socialise your puppy to sounds, find a "dog socialisation playlist", play it low around the house and get them used to hearing varied and different noises. Keep the sound low and slowly turn it up over time.
